History of Snee Farm

Fifteen thousand years ago, the Snee Farm climate was much cooler. Mammoth, mastodon, horses and bison roamed what was a grassy plain. When the golf course was constructed in 1969, mastodon bones were found to the left of the third fairway near the green, and the University of South Carolina's Department of Archaeology excavated and discovered bones and artifacts at least 10,000 years old.

As the Ice Age ended and the climate became warmer, mastodon and bison were replaced by deer and squirrel. A vibrant stream running through the property became a calm brook, which was the center of life for prehistoric tribes. Two thousand years ago all of Snee Farm was controlled by the Seewee Indians, who called it "Mock Land", meaning our land. A thriving Indian city, Datah, was established on the brook leading to the Wando River.

The Seewee were allied with the Kiawah and Wando tribes when the English arrived. The Indians persuaded the Captain of the ship, Caroline, which entered Bull's Bay in 1670, to go on to what is now Charles-towne Landing. The English were perhaps outwitted, because this placed them between the Seewee and the fierce Westos tribe to the south. The Seewee's pottery and wood working skills stimulated a lively trade with the English.

In 1698, King William III of England granted the land that is now Snee Farm to Nathaniel Law who, in 1706, donated it for Christ Church. The original property consisted of 1100 acres and has changed size and owners many times over the years. In 1754, Colonel Charles Pinckney received the land, now part of the National Park Service, from John Savage as a fee for legal services. After building the simple Snee Farm house (the word Snee means bounteous or plentiful in Olde English), Colonel Pinckney settled into what was designed as a lawyer's country retreat rather than a working plantation. Colonel Pinckney's main abode was in Charles Towne, now known as Charleston,

and he also owned Fee Farm at Ashepoo.

When the British seized Charles Towne during the Revolution, Colonel Pinckney, under pressure, took an oath of loyalty to the crown in 1780. Subsequently, many prominent men captured by the British were paroled to Snee Farm including Charles Cotesworth, Pinckney, and Colonel William Moultrie. One brief skirmish between the British and Patriots, possibly where the manor section is now, was the only actual fighting in the area.

After the Revolution, many who, like Colonel Pinckney, had taken a loyalty oath to the crown were "relieved" of their property. However, Snee Farm remained in the Pinckney's hands because of the patriotism of the Colonel's son, Charles. When Colonel Pinckney died, Charles inherited the land. He served four terms as Governor of South Carolina and was famous nationally. At the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787, Charles presented a complete plan of Government: the "Pinckney Draft". The final Constitution contained over thirty of his proposals.

In May 1791, George Washington ate breakfast at Snee Farm under a huge oak. A silver spoon he may have used was found during restoration of the Pinckney house in the 1930's, and donated by Joyce Hollowell, a later owner, to the National Park Service. After breakfast, Washington took a ferry to Charles Town. He was greeted in the harbor by a boat carrying the St. Michael's choir, and met on land by dignitaries including Governor Charles Pinckney.

In 1817, Charles Pinckney sold Snee Farm to pay off debts. The next owner, William Matthews, built the standing structure in 1828 - the wings were added in the 1930's.

In 1853, owner William McCants destroyed much of the allee' of oaks leading from the house to the Georgetown Highway. Early 19th century plats of Snee Farm show much of the land as woodlands, with areas for "provision crops" and "rice lands". Indigo

cotton and later pecans were also cultivated. The present lakes were not created until the 20th century for hunting and fishing.

During the Civil War, Snee Farm slaves were recruited to supply labor for defense works around Charles Towne. After the War (and emancipation), the South's plantation system was in ruins, and Snee Farm suffered. In 1935, Ann S. Ewing bought the property for \$15,000 and began restoration with her husband, the Canadian Ambassador to the Netherlands. Many camellias around the house were gifts from Queen Julianna of the Netherlands.

In 1966, the plantation was purchased by Snee Farm Golf Club, and the house and adjoining grounds by Joyce and Guilds Hollowell. The Hollowells continued restoration, and in 1974 the house was designated a National Historical Landmark. The Friends of Snee Farm purchased the historic house and its 28 acres in the late 1980's. The core of Snee Farm is now known as the Charles Pinckney National Historic Site, a unit of the National Park Service.

So, you see, this is no ordinary community. Think of the mastodon and his successors who roamed where we now live and play. You will now understand what appear to be odd street names such as Law Lane, Ambassador Way, Governors Road, DeLeis-seline Boulevard, Casseque Province, and Cotesworth Court. When you walk behind the tennis courts and look at the historic Pinckney house, think of George Washington having breakfast under a large oak after, it is believed, his arrival by horse through our beautiful allee' of the Grande Oaks of Snee Farm.

Landscape Report

This is a report on the landscape projects that have been done or are in the process of being done at present.

A. The most important of our projects is the tree program we have implemented. We are very fortunate to have had all of the trees in Snee Farm assessed by P.O. Meade, Arborist, who is highly respected throughout the Southeast. Along with his expertise, we have set up a multi-year tree preservation program. This will include pruning, aeration and fertilization. A schedule has been set-up prioritizing the needs of the trees. This is one of the few such fertilization projects in the Trident area.

B. The general cleaning of our common grounds through removal of certain types of trees, aged, overgrown, improperly pruned and improperly located plants is an ongoing process. Through proper maintenance of these areas, the remaining plants and trees will thrive rather than compete for sunlight, air and growing space.

C. Liberty Circle trees and shrubs have been pruned and

beds added. The replanting will be completed by the spring. Benches have been added in the Circle to enhance the ambiance of the area. We intend to plant the raised bedding areas with a wide range of plant material.

D. Plantation Circle trees will be thinned and lifted to get better airflow and needed sunlight into the area. There are plans to locate a decorative bench in the Circle.

Ongoing planning and budgeting will address areas in need of improvement for purposes of maintaining our property values while creating an enjoyable environment in which to live.



Project Updates

MPWW Station Upgrades at Governors Road & behind Law Lane – We have monitored this closely and are pleased at their agreement to provide the fence and plant material screening needed. Estimated completed dates for both are end-April.

SCE&G Tree Cutting and Clearing Adjacent to Properties near Whipple Road – As you may know, the Foundation owns the land, but its use is restricted due to the long-standing and perpetual easement with SCE&G for the overhead transmission and distribution lines and related needs. We appreciated the input received regarding the recent episode of this cyclical work which also exposed the security fencing - much of which is in disrepair. The fencing will soon be repaired or replaced

where needed to a new appearance with as little disturbance possible to the remaining viable vegetation. SCE&G is agreeable to some replanting with material such as wax myrtle that will not pose a height problem in future. When planning your own landscaping solutions, please consider that some of the rear area of your properties provide easement to utility companies including SCE&G. Only after the Foundation fencing work is completed, planting evergreen vines such as jasmine on it is permitted – this would provide additional buffer and help conceal the fencing. Some of you have wood fencing adjacent to the Foundation security fencing, and others may wish to do the same – all must meet the guidelines of the ADAR and be approved by the ACC.

Cut Fence Section at Moss Bluff & Longpoint Road – is being repaired, and the wood fencing

will be extended to discourage those who are damaging the fence to gain access in and out of Snee Farm.

Dept. of Transportation Brush Clearing & Tree Removal Adjacent to the Longpoint Entrances – They continue to do so at the Board's request to provide safer driver visibility when exiting.

Existing Foundation owned Street Lamp being Relocated at Parkway Entrance – Closer to the road to provide better visibility to incoming traffic.

Contracted with SCE&G for Additional Street Lighting on Casseque – At the lakes area for better security.

Treasurer's Report

The 2008 annual assessment invoices were mailed the last week of December. Payment is due by February 28, 2008 to avoid late fees and penalties. Please do not pay by cash - your cancelled check is the record if needed. If your remittance check has not cleared your bank within a reasonable period of time, contact us immediately so that we can identify the problem and not proceed with past due handling.

Unfortunately, each year, there are too many property owners who do not remit on time which creates additional work for us to collect, and requires the advancing of Foundation funds for legal expenses when necessary. This assessment occurs only once a year at the same time which affords advance planning. Because we operate within a budget, timely remittance is necessary. The Board is considering a recommendation to post the names of those late in the Newsletter.

I am pleased to report that the Board's hard work in wisely managing and spending these past few years has brought us to the point of not only being solvent, but enabling long-range planning to begin last year, some of which is already being achieved - for instance, the contracting of independent Arborist, Mr. P.O. Mead, began phase I planning and the start of long overdue care of our valued trees. It is essential that this program continue in the years to come to protect these Grande Oaks which are Snee Farm's signature feature.

Also in 2007 an emergency fund was established, and this year we will be able to start a capital improvement fund in the hope of being able to address needed larger projects (some of which are already being identified), and hopefully avoid special assessments to do so.

Maintenance Report

The Maintenance Committee is consistently very busy with projects large and small, the following are just a few of those completed over the last year:

Gazebo repairs: The Gazebo was power washed, rotten wood replaced, a new light fixture installed, the interior and exterior painted, the floor stained, and the weather vane repaired.

Signage: All four Snee Farm entrance signs were painted along with the information boards and restrictions/covenants signs. New street signs were installed in Snee Farm Gardens to match the existing signage throughout the rest of Snee Farm.

Benches: Several concrete pads have been installed throughout the community for the placement of the artisan stone-cast benches.

Lake Maintenance: The lakes in our community were stocked with 265 carp to help control algae. The fish are doing such a good job that more will be added this year. There is more to come, thank you for your support.

Restrictions Compliance (RCC)

It's a must for the aesthetic and living quality for all residents, and to protect property values. We greatly appreciate your self-compliance, and sharing information with your neighbors to help them. Following are reminders on some of the most common issues. This may not be complete detail, so please contact us in advance for clarification (or refer to the ADAR) to avoid being in violation which would incur a fine of \$20 per day per issue:

- Garbage (landscape/household debris) & receptacles can not be put out until the evening prior to collection (not into the street at night) - the receptacles must be removed the evening of collection and stored completely out of sight.
- Because of our drain/lake system, each of us must also clean our respective curb area of dirt, leaves, straw, trash, etc., when grooming our landscape and never send it into the street-top drains, ditches or lakes.
- Garage sale and real estate signs are permitted ONLY under certain terms including placement ONLY on the respective lot. NO signs are permitted in the common prop-

erty which includes all four entrance areas.

- One boat only may be in the driveway 14 continuous days (once per calendar year) for maintenance; otherwise it must be properly stored/screened at all times.
- NO Parking on lawns. No overnight street parking without a permit issued by the Board.
- A backflow meter is not a quality aesthetic feature - it must be installed in a location that allows it to be obscured from view - by landscape screening, approved covers, or both.
- Be sure to understand what requires Architectural Control Committee approval (before planning your projects) such as repairs, improvements (including any structure on your lot), tree removal (any tree in excess of 6" in diameter measured 2' from the ground). Violations may result if approval has not been obtained.
- Satellite dishes and installation locations must be approved by the ACC prior to installation.
- Landscape must be maintained regularly to

a quality aesthetic appearance (includes lawn edging).

- **DOGS & CATS** - Town Ordinance 90.29 (www.townofmountpleasant.com) and our ADAR must be followed to avoid related fines - more importantly, harm or nuisance to neighbors. No unleashed dog or cat may be off its owner's property roaming; they must be walked on a leash of no more than 8' in length. **No pets, even leashed, are permitted on any area of the golf course property (includes the paths and rough area).** Pet waste in our Common Areas must be immediately cleaned up and taken home to dispose of (**ditches, drains and lakes cannot be used for this purpose**). Neighbors' lawns and plantings are private property and should be respected by keeping pets from them to prevent being used as relief are as; if it happens by accident, same clean up rules apply. Barking must not be excessive or continuous (uncontrolled).

Thanks for your cooperation! If you are displeased with a RCC action, you may request a hearing with the full Board.

Club Update

The lawsuit filed against the owners of Snee Farm Country Club to halt the construction of new homes on a portion of the club grounds has recently been settled in favor of the Club according to Manager Mike Ashton. "We felt confident that we would win in court," he said. A note to club members inserted with the January bills mentioned that the club owners had, "received a letter from I'ON's attorney stating "due to market conditions we can no longer go forward with this project."" However, since that time, negotiations have re-opened with the I'ON group and Mike is still very optimistic about the project. "We are still working with I'ON and another potential developer to determine the specifics of how the club project will proceed, but right now we just want to concentrate on providing a fun environment for our current members and strengthening the Club's membership. The future at Snee Farm Country Club is very bright."

As owners you are entitled to use of the common areas, but you do so at your own risk.
